New Economic Development Strategy



The City of Kalamunda has approved its draft Economic Development Strategy to help drive economic growth in the area.

Mayor John Giardina said the City of Kalamunda's projected population increase will be a key driver of economic growth and is expected to influence a number of industries, particularly education, training, health care and retail. This will create job opportunities and drive demand for a range of goods and services to support household consumption.

"The City of Kalamunda will be a business destination spoilt for choice with a diverse mix of natural assets and employment drivers that complement each other in delivering locally sustainable jobs and businesses," Cr Giardina said. The City is committed to making its processes as efficient and clear as possible for new businesses seeking to grow or relocate.

"We can raise the profile of the Region through the proximity of Perth Airport to key tourism assets. We will promote the Region to interstate and overseas tourists as well as local visitors."

The Strategy indicates retail is an important sector in Kalamunda and local retailers will need to be innovative and responsive to consumer demand.

Growers of fruits and vegetables, wine, cider and honey producers all have an opportunity to attract tourists through diversification and value-adding.

City of Kalamunda Awarded for Engagement with Young People



The City of Kalamunda was awarded the winner of two categories in the 2017 Children's Environment and Health Local Government Report Card Project, presented on 8 December 2017 at the Bendat Centre in Wembley.

Mayor Giardina said "At the City of Kalamunda we recognise the importance of involving our young people in our community. We have worked hard to empower our youth to be more involved through the development and delivery of our Youth Plan 2017 –2022".

"It is fantastic to see the City recognised for its work in these areas. We are committed to being a community that listens to, engages with and involves our young people in decision making".

The first award was in the category for Children's Consultation, for the City's outstanding efforts in delivering consultation in developing the Youth Plan 2017–2022. The youth consultation involved over 600 people, which included two online surveys (for under 25 year olds and over 25 year olds) as well as face-to-face engagement with young people, residents and other stakeholders at a wide range of community events.

The second award was in the category Climate Change, for the City's Commemoration Tree Planting event, along with the Railway Heritage Trail Education Support Project, in partnership with Kalamunda Secondary Education Support.

Forrestfield North Local Structure Plan

The City of Kalamunda has been working with a consultant team and relevant State Government agencies on preparing the draft Local Structure Plans (LSPs) for Forrestfield North. Initial project planning envisaged the draft LSPs to be prepared by the end of December 2017 for presentation to Council for adoption to advertise early in 2018.

The City is pleased to advise the LSPs have been significantly progressed with key studies having now been completed or near completion:

- Detailed urban design and site planning;
- Detailed environmental analysis including spring surveys and noise and vibration modelling;
- Preparation of Local Water Management Strategies

(LWMSs);

- Comprehensive traffic modelling;
- Economic, employment and retail strategy;
- Concept civil designs for all major infrastructure; and
- Community infrastructure and open space planning.

The Forrestfield North area contains a number of significant environmental values and drainage considerations which require careful planning and attention.

The City is continuing to work closely with state government agencies including Metronet, the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage, the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation and the Office of the Environmental Protection Authority to work through these considerations.



To resolve technical aspects of the project associated with these matters a revised timeframe has been prepared. The City envisages the detailed plans to be presented to Council for adoption to advertise in March 2018.

Proposed Upgrade to Abernethy Road

The City of Kalamunda is lobbying the State Government to provide financial support for the muchneeded upgrade to Abernethy Road in High Wycombe from a single lane to a dual carriageway with an extension to the railway tunnel between Avonside Crescent and Adelaide Street.

This stretch of road is a key freight route currently unable to cope with the volume of vehicles servicing the surrounding industrial areas.

The projected population increases and heavy vehicle usage present serious economic, community and safety issues to our community, with the current daily vehicle usage of 15,000 projected to rise to 28,000 vehicles per day



by 2031. The capacity for road widening is currently restricted by the single carriageway over the Forrestfield Rail Tunnel.

Positive outcomes of the upgrade include reduced congestion on a key freight route, improved connectivity within a regional freight and logistics hub, safer movement of vehicles within the community and significant economic benefits to the freight



and logistics industry.

Elements of the project include: 3km of Abernethy Road to be upgraded to dual carriageway standard; a major extension to the railway tunnel to accommodate dual carriageway; upgrades to the insersections of Abernethy Road at Kalamunda Road, Dundas Road and Adelaide Street.

Maida Vale Reserve Master Plan



The City of Kalamunda is developing a Master Plan for Maida Vale Reserve to accommodate a range of sporting and community uses.

The City is looking at how best to make use of the precinct in ways that recognise its value as a community and environmental asset, at the same time, as a local centre for participation in sport, community and leisure activities.

Mayor Giardina said "Maida Vale Reserve has always served our community sporting groups well. As a generous sized space, the Reserve has enormous potential to be developed into something the sporting community and residents can enjoy. This is a good time to also review how we can improve

the Reserve. This is when we go back to the community and ask them what they value the most? What is most important? Do we want to see improved parking and access? Or do we want to see some changes in the design or facilities?".

The City in conjunction with ABV Leisure Consultancy Services will be running two Community 'Dropin Sessions' which will provide residents an opportunity to ask questions tabout the Master Plan project, and outline their vision for Maida Vale Reserve. The Sessions will be held at Norm Sadler Pavilion, Maida Vale Reserve, Ridgehill Road Maida Vale, with the first being on Wednesday 31 January 2018 from 5:30pm—7:30pm, and the second being on

Saturday 17 February 2018 from 10:30am–12:30pm.

A Community Workshop will also be held and will provide an opportunity for residents to give more detailed feedback. The Workshop will be held at Norm Sadler Pavilion, Maida Vale Reserve, Ridgehill Road, Maida Vale on Thursday 1 March 2018, from 5:30–7:30pm.

Jacaranda Springs Park

The City was successful in obtaining Cash-in-Lieu funds to upgrade Jacaranda Springs Park in High Wycombe. The Project involved a new multi-unit playground, climbing net, swing set, nature play area, picnic shelter, bench seating, mini basketball court, footpath extensions and solar lighting. Following the redevelopment, this park now provides a more attractive and exciting space that can be enjoyed by all ages.

Wittenoom Road Upgrade

Wittenoom Road in High Wycombe has benefited from road safety upgrades which include four traffic calming treatments and the upgrade of three intersections.

Civil works by Industrial Road Pavers, with the finishing touches of line markings and signage were completed by Main Roads Western Australia in late 2017.

Stirk Park Master Plan Adopted

A Master Plan paving the way to upgrade facilities at Stirk Park over the next 10 years has been approved by the City of Kalamunda.

The Master Plan recommends the Park be revamped in the next three years with a playground upgrade, a youth and sport precinct and a path network upgrade.

The City of Kalamunda has voted on the Park remaining as a District Level Park facility and green open space within the City.

Mayor Giardina said the community had been involved in the deliberations for the Master Plan with more than 650 responses for consideration for the upgrades. "We are committed to Stirk Park being a green open space where the community can gather to relax, play and enjoy its surrounds and tranquil setting."

Council also heard a powerful deputation from two local youth, Fabian Evans and Finn Caffery,



who presented a petition with more than 150 signatures to also relocate the Kalamunda Skate Park to the site. This will be considered as part of the project and incorporated for further community consultation on the detailed design for the Master Plan.

The Mayor congratulated the boys on taking the time to address the Council, and bringing forward the view of local youth.

The initial priority implementation for the Park includes a 1-3 year plan; a secondary implementation which is a 3-6 year plan and a tertiary implementation which has a 6-10 year plan.

An upgrade and realignment of the Kalamunda Club including the Bowling Green has been noted as an additional 10 year option.

Local Youth Graduate Environmental Program

The City of Kalamunda has recognised the achievements of Kalamunda Secondary Education Support Centre students with a Graduation Ceremony at the Zig Zag Cultural Centre. The students completed a 28 week environmental volunteering program in partnership with the City.

Over the period students contributed at least 375 hours of volunteer time, undertaking weed control, rubbish collection, path maintenance and wildlife surveys in partnership with the City of Kalamunda and the Friends of Railway Heritage Trail Reserve.

City of Kalamunda CEO, Rhonda Hardy, commended the students for their commitment to the project. "The effort the students put into the Railway Heritage Trail Reserve is testament to their passion for the environment."

"Celebrating successful partnerships like this is so important. It shows working together we can support our youth, our community and our environment".



Throughout the project the students also learnt about bird identification, the importance of native wildlife, Aboriginal Cultural Values and had a visit from Kanyana Wildlife.

The City has been successful in its funding application to Lotterywest for a Heritage and Conservation Grant of up to \$180,000 towards a conservation plan update and the remediation, conservation and refurbishment of the locomotive and railway station at Kalamunda History Village.

Hockey Facility to be complete in 2018



The City of Kalamunda will build three new hockey fields and develop a shared use clubroom for the Kalamunda and Districts Hockey Club in 2018, with works now underway. The facility will be located at the old Darling Range Pony Club site, a part of the Hartfield Park Reserve and signals

the final component of the site Redevelopment.

This community project was proudly supported by the State Government of Western Australia as part of \$6 million Hartfield Park Redevelopment Project. This project has included the upgrade of the Forrestfield United Soccer club rooms, implementation of managed aquifer recharge initiative, expansion of Morrison Oval, construction of additional sporting clubs' storage, upgrades to sports floodlighting across the reserve and development of new car parking and pathway facilities.

City Wins Innovation Award

The City of Kalamunda has taken out the WA Innovating for Sustainability Awards at the Australia Water Association Awards.

The Managed Aquifer Recharge project (MAR) is a unique project for Western Australia, developed by the City of Kalamunda to ensure the sustainability of the Hartfield Park Sporting Reserve into the future. Water is an extremely precious resource. This project actively manages this resource by reducing hard surface runoff while simultaneously restoring water levels in Perth's heavily depleted ground water system.

Mayor John Giardina said, "We are extremely proud to receive the award, and I congratulate the CEO Rhonda Hardy, Director Dennis Blair, Project Manager Daniel Nelson and all who have assisted to date. The Hartfield Park MAR scheme is Western Australia's first local government-managed MAR

scheme using aquifer storage and recovery."

The project showcases the dynamic and ethical leadership that is required to enable innovation in the public sector. It was developed by a City officer, who with the support of the team convinced the Executive and Council that it was worth the investment. This is something that had not been done before and showcased all the City's core values of Service, Respect, Diversity and Ethics.

"The City had to overcome several engineering challenges in the design and construction of the infrastructure necessary to meet the requirements outlined by the water resource management operating strategy for a stormwater harvesting and managed aquifer recharge trial.

The City is now investigating a water recycling strategy that utilises the harvested water



at Hartfield Park more broadly throughout the City municipality.

There are very limited examples of operational MAR projects in Western Australia and as such, successful application of this technology requires innovation and research to support bespoke design. This innovation is being shared with other local municipalities looking to deliver similar solutions to the water management challenges faced in Western Australia. Wattle Grove Stronger Communities Funding



Forrestfield Path Works

Upgrades to the Wandoo Road footpath in Forrestfield took place in December 2017.

Future renewal path works are scheduled over the next few months at Hartfield Recreation Centre and for three footpaths along Berkshire Road.

Wattle Grove Nature Playground on Lenihan Corner will be the home of a new mini-basketball court thanks to a Federal Grant for Building Stronger Communities.

The total cost of the project is \$40,000, with the City of Kalamunda contributing \$20,000. The project also includes landscaping at the Wattle Grove Nature playground site.

City of Kalamunda Mayor John Giardina said "The mini- basketbal court will be a great addition to the site."

"No matter your age, it is important to have a social life and fitness brings people together."

Works will follow the completion of the Woodlupine Living Stream project in July 2018.

Tonkin Highway Upgrades Proposed

The City of Kalamunda is advocating for upgrades along Tonkin Highway at the intersections of Welshpool and Hale Roads, advising it will reduce the risk of accidents, improve safety for the travelling public and improve connectivity for residents and visitors to the Eastern region.

Grade separations at the intersections will ensure increased efficiency of the freight network

through higher average vehicle speeds and reduce congestion particularly during peak traffic periods.

The City would like the State and Federal Government to prioritise these grade separations.

Residents who wish to fly drones recreationally are reminded you must only fly during the day and keep your drone within visual line-of-sight.

This means being able to see the aircraft with your own eyes at all times.

If you are in controlled airspace, which covers most Australian cities, you must not fly higher than 120 metres.

Help us detect European Wasps this summer

Summer is officially here, and so is wasp season.

The European Wasp is not only a public nuisance but also a pest threatening our horticultural industries and environmental health.

Most active during the months of December to May, the European Wasp can potentially establish and spread. Early detection and ongoing monitoring is vital to prevent establishment and reduce risk of invasion.

Western Australia has so far avoided establishment, only possible by residents, businesses, industry and government working together to monitor these pests.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD) 'Adopt-atrap' initiative has been successful, with more than 1,000 surveillance traps adopted to date.

Hummerston Road

The City will be undertaking community consultation with local residents over February and March 2018, following two petitions regarding Hummerston Road. Residents in Paulls Valley and Piesse Brook will be asked their views on the proposal for the "unformed" portion of the Hummerston Road road reserve to be reopened to traffic from Hummerston to Fern Road. This portion of the road reserve is currently closed and gated for use as an emergency access track.

Road Safety a Priority

In the first half of 2018, upgrades will be carried out on Orange Dale Road in Lesmurdie and Bird Road and Josephine Crescent in Kalamunda. Pedestrian crossings will also be installed on both Spring Road and Gladys Road in Kalamunda.



European Wasp is a concern to the community and can pose risk to not only our crops, but can also severely impact our environment and outdoor lifestyle should wasps become established in our region".

"Last year we successfully worked with the Department to identify and eradicate a nest in Lesmurdie near Flora Terrace".

"We urge residents to keep an eye out for any unusual wasp activity, and if you see something, say something, either by contacting the City, or by participating in the Adopt-a-trap initiative".

Adopting is easy, simply request a trap, hang your trap with bait (raw fish or meat) in a shaded but unobstructed area. Traps should be cleaned every week to fortnight if possible and deployed from early December to early June.

Lesmurdie Drainage Upgrades





Drainage upgrades to address flooding in Walyunga Street in Lesmurdie were recently completed. Residents should see an improvement for water drainage on this road, with the upgrade being completed in conjuction with an asphalt upgrade for the area.

Over the next three to six months, two drainage upgrade projects in Lesmurdie will be undertaken. Booligal Street will see the installation of a new drainage system from Barwon Street to the creek line. The piping and open drain on Kimbarlee Way will be upgraded to a pipe system feeding into the creek.

Road Works in Canning Mills

Road works to reseal the pavement and improve the road surface on Canning Road

in Canning Mills will commence over the next three to six months.

Public Open Space Strategy

The City of Kalamunda is calling for comment on a draft Public Open Space Strategy to meet the sporting, recreation and conservation needs of community and local environment in the future.

The Strategy will form a component of the City's new Local Planning Strategy 2018, which will provide direction for areas of housing, activity centres, environmental planning, planning incorporating industrial zones, infrastructure and servicing.

The previous Local Public Open Space Strategy was adopted in 1996. The overarching purpose of the strategy is to ensure public open space is optimised for community benefit.

Mayor Giardina said the vision of the Strategy was to provide the City with a network of fit for purpose parkland that protects the natural resources and meets community need.

"We want to promote and support Liveable Neighbourhoods with our Public Open Space so everyone can access and enjoy the beautiful



surroundings here."

"Well-designed open spaces will deliver a wide range of benefits to the wider community who use public open spaces. We seek to provide high quality and accessible recreational facilities and social spaces."

"Our City is unique in the fact that we have nature right on our doorstep. The Wattle Grove Nature Playscape is one such concept for bringing nature back to the suburbs."

Comment on Draft Bicycle Plan

The City has released its proposed Bicycle Plan 2017 for public comment.

The Bicycle Plan has been developed, following extensive consultation undertaken by Cardno Consulting between February and March in 2017. As part of the process, two community workshops were held and the survey generated over 200

responses. Feedback from the consultation has helped to shape the development of the revised plan.

"Our goal is to connect our communities, through improving cycling participation. From professional riders, those riding to work and families going for a weekend ride, we want our City to be one every cyclist can enjoy".

The City is seeking feedback on the Draft Bicycle Plan 2017. Residents will also be able to drop in at any of the Community popups throughout the City's major shopping centres, recreation centres and City events between February and March. Asset Levels of Service

Do we need to do more with our roads, drainage and footpaths, do less, or maintain at the current standard?

The City of Kalamunda is calling for comment in relation to the status of roads, drains and footpaths. Mayor John Giardina said, "Our community has a diverse range of expectations and needs. We are seeing an increased demand on services and strong desire to protect and enhance our natural heritage assets."

"We would like the community's views on the current performance of our assets, and how we can maintain and develop these to meet our growing needs."

Assets are managed for the long term sustainability of the community and for current and

future generations. As part of this work, we need to know what you think is needed in the way the assets perform. For roads, pathways and drainage, the way the assets perform can be thought of in terms of them being cost effective, safe, capable, usable, high in amenity, and able to support your values.

The first Community Workshop will take place on Monday 12 February 2018, from 5:00pm to 7:00pm at City Administration, 2 Railway Road, Kalamunda.

The second workshop will take place on Thursday 15 February 2018, from 5:00pm to 7:00pm at High Wycombe Community and Recreation Centre, 200 Newburn Road, High Wycombe.

The third and final workshop will



take place on Tuesday 27 February 2018, from 5:00pm to 7:00pm at Woodlupine Community Centre, 88 Hale Road, Forrestfield.
