2019 is shaping up to be a big year for capital works, with over 20 projects currently scheduled for completion this year alone.

Safety will be improved on the City's road network with six major road projects scheduled to get underway in the first half of the year.

Seven pathway projects are now under construction and two more are set to kick off by February.

Designs for the Kalamunda Community Centre and Kalamunda Tennis Club Toilet buildings are in progress and are due for completion this year.

The second stage of the Woodlupine Brook revamp will conclude in early 2019, with the completion of a half basketball court, outdoor exercise area as well as irrigation and grassing of the open spaces adjacent to the

Clubrooms and ovals are some of the other locations to undergo upgrades in 2019.

Kalamunda Wins Gold for Tourism



A commitment by the City of Kalamunda to develop and promote local tourism has been rewarded with the Perth Hills Visitor Centre taking home Gold at the 2018 Perth Airport WA Tourism Awards.

Facilities for the Future

The City has been working with the community to develop the Community Facilities Plan 2019 – 2039; a plan that will guide the future provision of community facilities within the City.

The plan will consider the needs of the broader community, identify any facility provision gaps and review the existing community, sport and recreation opportunities within the City.

This will identify the current standard and future requirements of sport, recreation and community facilities.



Consultation was undertaken in late 2018 and feedback is now being reviewed. The community's input will help shape the first draft of the Plan.

The draft Community Facilities Plan 2019-2039 will be advertised to the public for comment in mid 2019.

Adelaide Street

High Wycombe's Adelaide Street will receive a facelift this March as works commence to install traffic calming measures.

The hoon hot-spot will be reconfigured to include an additional slow point and median islands at the Stirling Crescent and Foxton Boulevard intersections. Improvements to the existing slow points, line-marking and signage will also be carried out.

Mayor John Giardina explained that when it comes to roads, the community's safety is of utmost priority.

"This is a built up area, with children, pedestrians and residents. Traffic calming measures will help mitigate the reckless driving and speeding often seen at this location."

The City has committed \$220,000 to the project, which will be implemented in the first quarter of 2019.











Pedestrian Refuge for Kalamunda Road

Works to install a pedestrian refuge island on Kalamunda Road, High Wycombe are expected to get underway in February 2019.

The \$35,000 project will include making the road wider, constructing a refuge island in the middle of the road, with pram ramps and a path to the bus stop.

The work will improve the safety for people crossing Kalamunda Road, near the Hillview Lifestyle Village.

Mayor John Giardina said, "Kalamunda Road is very busy at this location and needs a clearly



defined pedestrian crossing point to enable safe access to the public transport facilities."

The refuge is welcomed by local community members, particularly

Hillview Lifestyle Village who see a large number of residents and visitors requiring access to the bus stop on the northern side of Kalamunda Road.

Forrestfield North Residential Update



The Draft Local Structure Plan for Forrestfield North's Residential Precinct was endorsed by Council at December 2018's Special Council Meeting.

The Plan has now progressed to the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) for final approval.

In the meantime, the City has been working on the Development Contribution Scheme (a levy on new developments to ensure the costs of extra demand on Council infrastructure from the development are not imposed on the community).

The Scheme will cover the Residential Precinct and the adjacent Transit Oriented Precinct and will therefore be finalised following completion of the Transit Oriented Precinct Local Structure Plan. This plan is expected to go to community for comment later this year, before Council and WAPC endorsement is sought.

The community has been asked

to help with the official name of the suburb (which is currently referred to Forrestfield North), with \$500 on offer for the winning suggestion.

First round submissions closed in late 2018 and are currently being reviewed. The finalists will be released to the community in 2019 for a final vote.

Maida Vale Master Plan Endorsed



The Maida Vale Reserve Master Plan was endorsed by Council in December 2018.

Some of the short term recommendations of the plan include upgrading Norm Sadler Pavillion, upgrading the site's power, baseball batting cages, lighting and connecting the site to sewer.

The longer term vision includes upgrades to the existing netball courts, improved car parking and upgraded skate park.

Community Help Shape Scott Reserve's Future

Residents have helped guide the direction of Scott Reserve's future by participating in the first stage of community consultation for the Reserve's Master Plan.

The City called for community input in late 2018, asking for its needs to meet current and future demands.

The feedback is currently being collated to inform the first draft of the Master Plan. The draft is expected to be advertised to the public for comment by mid 2019.

Lighting Up Kala Sports Precinct

Kalamunda's Sporting Precinct will this quarter receive lighting improvements that will bring Kostera Oval to competition standard and the new Hedley Jorgensen Oval to training standard.

Jointly funded by the State Government, City of Kalamunda and local club contributions, the project involves upgrading the site's power supply and existing lighting towers and installing new training lights.

Kalamunda Sporting Precinct is considered to be one of the City's major reserves, used heavily each week of the year by sporting clubs, schools and others for sporting activities.

The new flood lighting will allow more teams to train and play simultaneously and reduce ongoing maintenance costs of the playing surface.



Community Centre Design Underway



Wheels are in motion for the \$6.65 million Kalamunda Community Centre project, with consultants secured and design development underway.

Construction of the Kalamunda Community Centre is funded by the Federal and State Governments, Lotterywest, the Kalamunda Community Learning Centre and the City.

The building will replace the existing Jorgensen Park Pavillion, which has now reached its end of practical life.

The initial concept design, developed in consultation with the Kalamunda Community Learning Centre and other potential users of the site, includes approximately 1,000m² of floor space, activity rooms, a crèche and outdoor play spaces.

The new premises will be accessible for a wide range of user groups of all ages and abilities. The design is expected to be finalised in the first half of 2019.

Planning Kalamunda's Town Centre

The City of Kalamunda is establishing a vision for the redevelopment and regeneration of the Kalamunda Activity Centre (KAC).

The vision is being set out in the City's Kalamunda Activity Centre Plan, a strategic document that will be put to Council to endorse for community feedback in mid-2019.

The Plan is being developed based on input from the community who assisted with extensive consultation in 2018.

Village Locomotive Works Underway

Works to remediate, conserve and refurbish the Kalamunda History Village's locomotive are now underway.

The City received a \$180,000 Heritage and Conservation Grant from Lotterywest to carry out the works.

The locomotive has been shrink wrapped since November 2016 after the identification of asbestos material during painting works.

Qualified professionals have been contracted to carry out the initial asbestos removal, which involves the construction of airtight enclosures around the locomotive.

The locomotive will be relocated to a suitable area by crane in order to construct the surrounding enclosures.

Works are expected to be complete by April 2019.

Road Network Upgrades



The road network in the Forrestfield North industrial precinct will undergo major changes, with approximately \$1.5 million in improvements in 2019.

The project scope includes upgrades to the Dundas Road/Berkshire Road/Milner Road, Milner Road/Nardine Close and Berkshire Road/Ashby Close intersections and an extension of Nardine Close.

Intersection works involve carriageway rehabilitation, localised road widening, line-

marking and signage installation. The Nardine Close extension will require the construction of a new carriageway, drainage swales and footpath.

The works complement the Ashby Close/Nardine Close modifications currently underway.

When complete, the industrial precinct's road network will better accommodate larger vehicle classes such as road trains. The City is on target to advertise seperately the intersection and

road extension works by way of public tender in early 2019. Tender award will be subject to Council consideration, placing project commencement in mid-2019.

Funding of the works has been secured under the Forrestfield North Industrial Development Scheme.

\$6.47 Million Upgrade for Hale Rd

Works to transform Hale Road in Wattle Grove are one step closer with the detailed design nearing finalisation and Western Power applications submitted.

The \$6.47 million project, funded by the Cell 9 Wattle Grove Development Scheme over two financial years, will see Hale Road widened between Welshpool Road East and Tonkin Highway. To facilitate the upgrades, median islands, pedestrian refuges, crossing points, footpaths, line-marking and signage will be installed. Overhead power infrastructure on the northern side of Hale Road will be undergrounded and trees will be planted in verges.

An additional \$57,000 will be allocated to the construction of the Arthur Road pathway from Hale

Road. The path will be located on the south-western side of Arthur Road and will improve safety for pedestrians.

Construction of the path will get underway in late January, whilst the Hale Road widening is expected to commence in late 2019 following the public tender process and Council consideration.

Berkshire Road Pedestrian Crossing



Since its upgrade in 2016, Berkshire Road has become a more efficient route for road users. Crossing the road on foot, however, has remained a challenge.

To improve pedestrian safety, the City of Kalamunda is funding a \$40,000 pedestrian crossing on

Berkshire Road in the vicinity of Ilex Way.

To accommodate the crossing, localised road widening and a median island will be constructed. The island will include a refuge area, pram ramps and pathway connections.

Skate, Scooter and BMX Clinics



Whether you're a pro skater or just starting out, the City of Kalamunda regularly hosts skate, scooter and BMX clinics for all ages and abilities.

These clinics are run in partnership with proskate groups Freestyle Now and Skateboarding WA and are held at the Kalamunda, High Wycombe and Forrestfield Skate Parks.

Multimillion Dollar Enhancements Put to Community

Community feedback on the multimillion dollar concept design for Cambridge Reserve is currently under review.

Submissions and comments are being considered to confirm if the project has community support to proceed and if so, what design changes should be examined.

The City sought feedback on the concept design in mid-2018, following earlier community visioning exercises.

The aim of the design was to deliver an intergenerational public open space that can be used and enjoyed by all ages.

Key features include a living stream, half basketball court, enclosed dog exercise area, footpaths, grassed areas, barbeque facilities, playground, revegetated areas and preservation of existing bushland of environmental value.

The delivery of the multimillion



dollar enhancements would only be made possible through the sale of some of the Reserve's vast 10.98 hectares.

The concept suggests some of that land be dedicated to an aged care site, to help address the significant shortfall of aged care housing facilities in the area.

A smaller portion of that land is proposed for over 55's and

residential development. The passive surveillance provided by the park-facing residential developments are likely to help mitigate the anti-social behaviour currently reported to be occuring at the Reserve.

Assessment of the community's feedback and a report to Council is expected to be delivered in 2019.

Half a Million in Upgrades Underway on Canning Road

Shoulder widening works have commenced on Canning Road between Pomeroy Road and Welshpool Road East.

Works involve widening the road shoulders to up to one metre either side of the carriageway. Safety barriers, markers and linemarking will also be installed.

The increased shoulder width and safety barrier protection will help to reduce road run-off crashes.

Over \$300,000 has been allocated to the project as part of the State



government's BlackSpot Program.

Almost \$200,000 has been provided by the City, totalling over

\$500,000 in road improvement funding.

Cockatoo Nest Boxes Attract Birds at Vernallen Reserve



City of Kalamunda Friends of Vernallen Reserve volunteer group have been working with renowned Environmentalist, Simon Cherriman, to install two artificial Cockatoo nest boxes in Lesmurdie bushland as habitat options for endangered Cockatoo species.

One of the biggest challenges faced by Cockatoos is the availability of nesting hollows.

Without these hollows, the birds are unable to successfully breed, placing the endangered animal at further risk.

Following the nest box installation, the Friends Group initiated a monitoring program. Seven local families volunteered to spend one day a week observing for nesting activity during September and October.

The monitoring suggested an increase in Cockatoo activity, evidenced by swathes of chewed gum-nuts, twigs and leaves.

An unexpected but excellent outcome from the nest box installation was the sighting of 12 other birds using the reserve. These included Red Wattle Birds, Magpies, Butcher Birds, Ringnecked Parrots, Brown Honey Eaters, Boobook Owls, Australian Ravens, Kookaburras, Rock Doves, Willie Wagtails, Bronzewing Pigeons and Tawny Frog mouths!

Patterson Road Improvements Kick Off

One kilometre of shoulder widening works are underway on Patterson Road, between Bracken Road and Walnut Road in Pickering Brook.

The tender for the \$350,000 project was awarded in December 2018 under delegated authority

and is jointly funded by the Federal Government Roads 2 Recovery Project and City of Kalamunda.

The scope of works includes new stormwater V-drains, line-marking, marker posts and shoulder widening of up to 6000mm each side of the carriageway.



Mundaring Widening Works on Target for Second Quarter

Upgrades to Mundaring Weir Road shoulders are on schedule to commence in the first quarter of 2019, with an item to go to Council in relation to the tender award in January 2019.

Shoulders will be widened to between 0.6m and 1.2m from

Fern Road to the City's boundary, covering over nine kilometres of road.

The \$2.5 million State BlackSpot project, jointly funded by the State government and City of Kalamunda, will help mitigate road run-off crashes.



Path Upgrades for Pickering Brook Road

Pedestrian safety is the focus of a new \$85,000 City of Kalamunda funded pathway upgrade to Pickering Brook Road.

Frequented by children, the path

will be upgraded to include a safe pedestrian crossing point in the vicinity of Cunnold Street.

The path will also be extended between Cunnold Close and

Cunnold Street.

The work is expected to commence in February 2019, following completion of the detailed design.

Draft Environmental Land Use Planning Strategy

The City of Kalamunda is calling for comment on a Draft Environmental Land Use Planning Strategy (ELUPS) to improve environmental outcomes through strategic and statutory planning to meet the needs of the community into the future.

The overarching purpose of the Strategy is to identify the environmental factors that will influence planning processes in the City and how these factors can be addressed during the assessment of development applications and subdivisions.

A key goal is to improve biodiversity and promote more sustainable planning practices which are sensitive and complementary to the existing natural ecosystem.

Mayor John Giardina said, "The Strategy will form a component of the City's new Local Planning Strategy, which will provide direction for areas of housing,



activity centres, environmental planning, planning incorporating industrial zones, infrastructure and servicing."

Rising populations, living costs and environmental consciousness have resulted in innovative housing solutions being developed around the globe. From Tiny Homes on Wheels (THOW) to Cooperative Developments, the alternative housing movement is progressing in leaps and bounds.

The City of Kalamunda is exploring ways to make these options more accessible to community members and is calling for your input.

Mayor John Giardina said, "Property developments are governed by a set of policies and guidelines. Some

of the alternative housing solutions such as THOW fall into a grey area of policy. Our aim is to gather community feedback to assist with refining the policies to make the pursuit of these housing alternatives much easier for those that would like to go down that path. We are also seeking community feedback to develop a strategic plan to guide the City's approach to new development types."

Owners or occupiers are required to maintain the barrier in such a condition that it functions always.

"It gives me great pleasure to recognise our three overall winners, Celia, Damien and Tobias. Their acts of good will, commitment and generosity have made our community a better place to live and belong."

Senior local hero, Celia Cheffins, has been the driving force behind the Zig Zag Festival for over a decade. The Festival is highly regarded, drawing thousands of attendees each year. As a

volunteer, much of Celia's work requires full-time focus with her efforts also including the Zig Zag Community Arts Inc. which host a range of activities throughout the year.

Recipient of the overall Community Local Hero, Damien Lee, is recognised for his extraordinary effort in saving the life of an 18-month old child. On an ordinary walk with his dog, Damien spotted the child lying in the water and immediately jumped in to save her, commencing CPR. Doctors reported that if he had stepped in just 30 seconds later, the child would have suffered brain damage.

Young Local Hero, Tobias Bailye, decided to host a bake sale, where he gathered ideas from customers on how to improve the community. Tobias donated the bake sale funds to the City of Kalamunda to make these ideas a reality.

Mayor John Giardina expressed his gratitude to the winners and all nominees for helping to make the community a happier, healthier and safer place to live.
