Kalamunda Water Park celebrates 60 years

Kalamunda Water Park reopened in November 2024, marking 60 years since it first welcomed the community.

Over the decades, the park has evolved, with the addition of water slides and a toddler pool, making it a much-loved local attraction. As part of the milestone celebrations, the annual Australia Day event was combined with the park's 60th anniversary, drawing an impressive crowd of visitors.

Families and friends enjoyed a day of fun in the sun, reminiscing about fond memories while creating new ones.

The park continued to operate seasonally, with the final swim of the season taking place on Monday, 31 March 2025.





Haynes Street revival project

The City of Kalamunda, RAC, and the Kalamunda Town Team teamed up in February 2025 to give Haynes Street a vibrant makeover! Led by the City's Youth Advisory Council, Youth Action Kalamunda, the project has brought new life and energy to the strip. The revitalised street is now a lively hub for the community, offering a fresh and inviting atmosphere.

Environmental education initiatives flourish across local schools

The City of Kalamunda continues to build a strong environmental stewardship culture in our community, with local students actively participating in environmental education programs. Through the Adopt-A-Patch initiative and various educational excursions, students have had the opportunity to engage with nature, learning firsthand about biodiversity conservation and sustainability.

KSESC: Birds and weed control


The Adopt-A-Patch class at KSESC recently learned about the diverse birdlife of the Perth Hills from local author Talitha Huston. Students used field guides and binoculars to identify species during a bird walk at Andrew Street Reserve. Later in the year, they tackled weed control at the Kalamunda Heritage Trail Reserve, removing invasive species and creating a safe habitat for local bandicoots by refreshing their bungalows.

Simon Cherriman: Nest-box workshop

Local ecologist Simon Cherriman shared his expertise with students at Mary's Mount Primary School through a workshop on nest boxes for hollow-dependent wildlife. The students built their own boxes and learned about the challenges facing species that rely on tree hollows. Simon also installed a donated possum box at the school, helping enhance their Adopt-A-Patch site.

Huntley Street Reserve: Improving bushland

Students from KSESC visited Huntley Street Reserve, where they assessed the health of local bushland and identified





areas for improvement. They created a plant wishlist focused on native species to support local wildlife, including the Threatened Black Cockatoo. This project is part of ongoing efforts to improve the reserve's biodiversity.

Mary's Mount Primary: Earthcare expo

The City's Natural Areas team joined the Earthcare Expo at Mary's Mount Primary, leading an activity focused on riparian plantings along the Currawong Drive Reserve creek. Students planted native species, learning about plant growth, seasonal changes, and water management within natural areas.

The City of Kalamunda is proud to work alongside our schools to empower the next generation with the tools and knowledge needed to protect our unique natural heritage. These educational initiatives are just the beginning of a long-term commitment to environmental sustainability and conservation within our community.

Norm Sadler Pavilion redevelopment underway at Maida Vale Reserve

Construction is now underway on the major redevelopment of the Norm Sadler Pavilion at Maida Vale Reserve, marking a significant milestone for the City of Kalamunda. Work began in early 2025, with completion expected by mid-to-late 2026.

This project is supported by \$2.4 million in funding from the WA Government. In December 2024, Council awarded the construction tender to AE Hoskins, paving the way for modern, accessible, and inclusive facilities for the community.

Once completed, the upgraded pavilion will provide enhanced amenities for local sporting clubs, supporting a range of sports, including cricket, diamond sports, and football (soccer).

The redevelopment aims to encourage participation, improve safety, and foster community engagement, ensuring Maida Vale Reserve remains a vibrant hub for local sport and recreation.

This investment underscores the City's commitment to supporting grassroots sport and delivering high-quality community infrastructure for years to come.





Maida Vale Primary School: Native planting day

As part of the Adopt-A-Patch program, Maida Vale Primary School students worked together to plant native species, enhancing the habitat for local wildlife.

The school's 'Eco Warriors,' a dedicated group of Year Seven students, guided their peers through proper planting techniques, emphasizing the importance of native plants. This project helps support the Banksia Woodland, a nationally protected ecological area, improving biodiversity while creating a healthier environment for local fauna.





SOUTH EAST WARD

Now complete New unisex changerooms at Ray Owen Reserve

The City of Kalamunda has completed the construction of new unisex changerooms at Ray Owen Reserve, providing modern, inclusive facilities to support the growing number of female athletes in the community.

Funded through a \$1.1 million grant from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, WA Football, Western Australian Cricket Association and Clubs, this project delivers two unisex changerooms, first aid/medical rooms, accessible public toilets, and additional storage. These upgrades directly benefit local AFL and Cricket clubs, both of which have expanding women's programs.

Designed to meet the needs of players and the wider sporting community, the new facilities ensure Ray Owen Reserve remains a welcoming and accessible sporting hub for all.



Pickering Brook sports floodlighting

The Pickering Brook Football Club, with support from the State Government's Club Night Light Program, the City, and the Club itself, is set to install new LED floodlighting at George Spriggs Reserve.

The upgraded 150-lux lighting will benefit not only the football club but also the local drone club and community events hosted at the reserve.

Construction is scheduled to begin in early 2025, with the club hoping to have the lights on in time for the 2025 football season.


Mazenod College Water conservation expo

As part of the Water Issues Expo at Mazenod College, Year 7 students presented solutions for water conservation challenges.

City staff judged the displays and selected winners based on their research and engagement.

The event promoted water-wise practices and strengthened community involvement in environmental awareness.

Brightening the game New sports floodlighting at Hartfield Park

The City of Kalamunda has successfully completed the installation of new LED sports floodlighting at Hartfield Park Hockey/Teeball Reserve, enhancing opportunities for evening training and competition.

This project was made possible through a \$91,000 grant from the State Government's Club Night Light Program, alongside contributions from the Kalamunda Districts Hockey Club, Bendigo Bank, and City municipal funds.

Throughout the 2023/2024 financial year, the City progressed the lighting design, awarded the construction tender, and oversaw installation, ensuring the project met Australian standards for hockey. The upgraded 300-lux floodlighting significantly improves visibility, making it safer and more accessible for players to train and compete under lights.

This investment in local sports infrastructure reflects the City's commitment to supporting clubs and ensuring that Hartfield Park remains a premier sporting destination for the community.

Hartfield Park stage 2A projects

Final designs for the Hartfield Park Stage 2A Projects were completed and put out for tender in December 2024. Over the next two years, the following upgrades will be delivered:

- A new AFL/Little Athletics Pavilion at Reid Oval
- New changerooms and upgrades to the Rugby League Pavilion
- Co-location of Tennis and Bowls, with a modernised Bowls facility and a new Tennis facility featuring shared changerooms and additional courts with lighting
- Two new modular unisex changerooms for soccer
- A new Foothills Men's Shed

This transformative project is made possible through the generous support of the Federal Government's Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts through the Priority Community Infrastructure Program (PCIP), Lotterywest, and the City of Kalamunda.



In September 2024, the City proudly celebrated the official opening of the Magnolia Way Reserve All Abilities Playground with an afternoon of fun-filled activities. Attendees had the chance to explore the new amenities, enjoy recreational play, and take part in a treasure hunt organized by the City's Youth Action Kalamunda's primary school team.

This inclusive playground, designed to be accessible to children of all abilities, was made possible with funding from the State Government through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, following an election commitment from Stephen Price MLA, Member for Forrestfield.



The playground features a range of interactive elements that encourage physical, social, and imaginative play, including a Sensory Dome, Climbing Cubes, and an accessible Hammock. With additional amenities such as a shelter, BBQ facilities, a drinking fountain, picnic areas, and plenty of seating, it's the perfect spot for a family outing. Accessible parking, toilets, and footpath access ensure that everyone can enjoy the space comfortably.



This project was funded by the State Government through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries via a \$1m election commitment from Stephen Price MLA, Member for Forrestfield.

Teaching kids to sort waste the fun way

This summer, young children across the City of Kalamunda got hands-on with waste sorting through Let's All FOGO!—a fun, interactive program designed to teach kids about recycling and the Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) system.

Throughout January, each of the City's four libraries hosted a Let's All FOGO! show, welcoming 50 enthusiastic children and their



caregivers. The star of the show? Milli the lively chicken puppet, joined by her sidekick Mike from Adventure Kids Entertainment. With their help, kids eagerly sorted waste into mini red, lime-green, and yellow-lidded bins, learning valuable lessons about recycling along the way.

Beyond the libraries, over 200 children at daycare and out-of-school care centres also took part. Educators praised the program, highlighting how its songs and interactive performances kept kids engaged while reinforcing good recycling habits.

And the fun doesn't stop there! More performances are planned for early childhood students in local primary schools, helping to build lifelong habits for a cleaner, greener future.

Turning waste into opportunity: Containers for Change

Did you know that 14% of rubbish collected during Clean Up Australia Day is made up of plastic bottles and cans?

To make recycling easier, the City of Kalamunda has partnered with Containers for Change and social enterprise Dismantle to install convenient collection cages across the area. With 36 exchange points throughout the City, it's never been easier to make a difference.

Here's how it works:

Collect eligible 10c containers

Drop them into a Containers for Change cage

Anyone can take them to a Containers for Change Depot or Self-serve Kiosk and redeem the refund

This initiative isn't just about sustainability—it's also about creating social impact. Dismantle's ReNew Property Maintenance program provides valuable entry-level job opportunities for at-risk young people, equipping them with hands-on skills to build a brighter future.

By choosing Containers for Change, you're not only helping to reduce landfill and keep our neighbourhoods clean—you're also supporting young people in gaining employment and breaking cycles of disadvantage.

Together, we can turn everyday actions into lasting change. So, next time you finish a 10c container, skip the bin and drop it into a Container Exchange Point instead!

Not all heroes wear capes A day in the life of our Rangers







Did you know our City Rangers respond daily to urgent, often heartbreaking situations-always with quick action, empathy, and unwavering dedication? Not all heroes wear capes; sometimes, they wear a uniform and badge, stepping in when it matters most to protect and care for our community's most vulnerable.

In July 2024, our Rangers rescued five neglected, hungry, and scared dogs from a dire situation. A concerned landlord contacted the City, worried that pets were being kept on their property without permission. When our Rangers arrived, they uncovered a heartbreaking reality—five dogs, abandoned weeks earlier by a former housemate. The remaining occupants had tried their best to care for them but lacked the resources to meet their needs.

At the pound, it became clear just how much these dogs had endured. They hid food, unsure when their next meal would come. Among them were two tiny pups, Jeremy and Oliver, still nursing from their exhausted mother, Lulu, despite being four months old. The strain on Lulu's health was severe, and without intervention, their future was uncertain.

With no permission for the dogs to remain and no response from the original owner, the City took custody and transferred them to a trusted rehoming agency. There, they received the urgent care they so desperately needed, including proper nutrition, grooming, sterilisation, microchipping, and vaccinations—essential steps in preparing them for a fresh start.

We're thrilled to share that all five dogs have now found their forever homes, thriving in safe and loving families. Their journey is a testament to the dedication of our Rangers and the power of compassion, reminding us that with the right help, every animal deserves a second chance at a happy, healthy life.

Engaging the community in conservation

The City of Kalamunda's environmental efforts over the past six months have not only showcased the beauty and biodiversity of our region but also engaged the community in meaningful, hands-on experiences that encourage a deeper connection with nature. Through a series of workshops, field days, and educational talks, the City has empowered residents of all ages to take part in preserving and enhancing the environment around them





Understanding our forests

One of the key highlights of the year was the Forest Die-Off talk held in July at the Kalamunda Hotel. Local researchers Dr. Katinka Ruthrof and Dr. Joe Fontaine presented their findings on the forest die-off events observed in 2011 and 2024.

With climate change leading to more extreme droughts, these talks gave the community a critical understanding of how our forests are responding to environmental stresses and the urgent need for action. This discussion was just one example of the many educational opportunities provided to residents to understand the challenges facing our natural world.

Nest Boxes for Native Wildlife

For those looking to get more involved, the City has offered a variety of hands-on workshops aimed at teaching sustainable practices.

In August, local ecologist Simon Cherriman led a session at Kalamunda Library on how to build nest boxes for native wildlife.

These workshops are crucial in encouraging residents to contribute directly to the wellbeing of local species, providing homes for wildlife like cockatoos, parrots, and possums that rely on tree hollows for shelter.



Learning from the land

The City's collaboration with Perth NRM brought an additional layer of learning through the Six Season Walks series, where Uncle Neville Collard shared his extensive traditional ecological knowledge.

These walks, starting in Lesmurdie Falls and spanning multiple local governments, provided an opportunity for participants to learn about the Djilba season and the ways native plants and animals were used by Aboriginal people.

These walks have allowed locals to engage with the land in a culturally rich and environmentally conscious way, deepening their understanding of the connections between people and the natural world.





Getting up close with native animals

The City's ongoing relationship with Kanyana Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre brought an interactive educational experience for families throughout September and October. The Wildlife Wonders sessions gave children and adults the opportunity to meet native animals up close, learn about their habitats, and understand how we can protect these creatures. The program captured the imagination of residents, fostering a sense of responsibility for our local wildlife and creating a generation of ecoconscious individuals eager to make a difference.

Discovering Kalamunda's birdlife

For those with a keen interest in birdwatching, the City's Discover Lesmurdie's Birds events provided an opportunity to explore the birdlife of the region.

Led by local experts Mike and Rachel Green, the events combined informative talks and guided walks through Korung National Park where participants could identify local species and contribute to national bird counts. These events not only fostered a love of birding but also helped gather valuable data for local conservation efforts.





Preserving our Waterways

One of the standout events was a field day at Kadina Brook Reserve, which explored the power of water management in preserving local habitats.

Residents heard from sustainability experts about how effective water retention can improve the quality of local ecosystems, enhance biodiversity, and even combat the impacts of drought.
